An extract from last month's article about the shed graffiti attack has been forwarded onto Pam Gates for inclusion into the next issue of the Dingley Dossier.


The management committee had their regular meeting with Parks Vic in July and a few of the items of general interest to the members are as follows:-

- The freeway underpass linking Braeside Park to Woodlands Drive is well underway.
- Ambulance emergency access to the shed is still being investigated.
- o SMRC Community Garden work is proceeding as needed.
- Maintenance of Cypress Drive by DVMS is still continuing.
- Friends of Braeside Park have obtained a koala for display in the visitors centre and DVMS will be constructing a display case for this item with material being funded by FOBP.
- Ground work surrounding the two new water tanks will be undertaken by DVMS with material costs being provided by SMRC.
- The security gate at Cypress Drive will be locked on weekends to hopefully increase security to the visitors centre and to DVMS.
- o All ground works projects have been put on hold due to the weather and present lockdowns.

When we do finely get back to our Friday gatherings, Theo will be sadly missed from our discussion table.


FRANK SMITH: #28



We have photos of the damage that was done but none of it worthy of an entry in our newsletter, it's just mindless damage.

We have had 2 graffiti attacks at the shed over the last 4 weeks.

The 1st attack was on Friday 26th June & 2nd on Friday 17th July.

Police were notified & attended, we contacted our insurance company following the 1st episode & they arranged for a quote for the rectification work to be carried out.

Member Jack Sunter gave me the details of a company that specialises in graffiti removal. Their quote was much less than the quote that the insurance company's builder submitted & we are proceeding with them.

We have had a 2nd. attack since we received our quotes. We are going to proceed with the rectification when it is appropriate taking into account our present building programme. We are not going with insurance company as our In speaking with the police following our 2nd. attack it appears that they are related. Police are making progress with gathering evidence to get to the bottom of the events & bring the perpetrators to justice.


