SEPTEMBER 2020 NEWSLETTER

Well we have all survived another month of staying home and hasn't the time just flashed by. You no sooner bring the rubbish bins in then it's time to take them back out again. On the bright side, we may well be heading toward some form of normality if the infection rates continue to reduce which will be great especially if it means getting out and away from home more often - the winter months are now supposedly behind us and those few warm days that we have been treated with have been a great reprieve from the cold, not to mention a saving on the gas heating bill. Several other notable things occurred during August:

75th Anniversary of the End of World War Two (WWII)

The 15 August, Victory in the Pacific Day, commemorates Japan's acceptance of the Allied demand for unconditional surrender, made on 14 August 1945. For Australians, it meant that the Second World War was finally over.

Activities to mark the 75th anniversary of this day will recognise and thank living WWII veterans, acknowledge the service of all WWII veterans and explore Victoria's WWII history and stories.

Our secretary Paul has circulated some great emails on this that make very worthwhile reading.

Wattle Day is a day of celebration in Australia on the first day of September each year, which is the official start of the Australian spring. This is the time when many Acacia species (commonly called wattles in Australia), are in flower. So, people wear a spring of the flowers and leaves to celebrate the day.

Although the national floral emblem of Australia is a particular species, named the golden wattle (*Acacia pycnantha*), any acacia can be worn to celebrate the day.

The day was originally intended to promote patriotism for the new nation of Australia:

August 13th is Left-Handers' Day, a day for left-handed people to forget about the right-handed world they live in.


Research suggests that between ten and twelve percent of the world's population is left-handed and even though being left handed might mean struggling with right-handed scissors from time-to-time, there are plenty of reasons being a lefty is pretty cool.

Left-hand leaders

Though left-handers make up a small percentage of the world's population, many have had very important jobs. Several past US presidents have been left-handed, including Bill Clinton and Barack Obama.

In Britain, former prime minister David Cameron is left-handed, as was famous wartime PM, Winston Churchill. Future King of the United Kingdom, Prince William is also left-handed.

William's great-grandfather George VI was naturally left-handed too, but his father George V forced him to write with his right hand.



When left isn't right

Just like Prince William's great-grandfather George VI, it wasn't uncommon in the past for left-handers to be forced to use their right hand to do things.

Until recently in the UK left-handed people were historically forced as children to use their right hands for tasks where they would naturally use their left hand. This still happens in some countries now.

In many parts of the world, the left hand is considered unclean or rude to use. If you're lefthanded and visiting places like India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Indonesia, Nepal and the Middle East, it's thought of as rude behaviour to eat, pick up or hand over things with your left hand. Even language proves that left-handers get a bad

In French, "gauche" can mean "left" or "clumsy". In English the word 'left' comes from the Anglo-Saxon word 'lyft', meaning 'weak'. "Right" also means "to be right".

Lefties accused of witchcraft!

So, as we know for many cultures, being left-handed is considered to be a bad thing and historically that's been the case too!

Left-handed people have been considered unlucky and even evil - the word "sinister" comes from the Latin word for left.

In Britain in the Middle Ages, lefties were associated with the devil and often accused of the crime of witchcraft, meaning they would get burned at the stake.

Thankfully, left-handers only have to worry about smudging their handwriting these days.

Some studies suggest more and more people are left-handed, but that's probably because it was previously seen as such a bad thing so people didn't admit to it.



What's news in the park

Hi all:

Please be advised that Parks Victoria has secured a number of Working for Victoria Teams which are funded through the State Government.

Many of these teams have been operation for a couple of months.

The South East Melbourne District has been allocated one of those teams.

The Team consists of a Supervisor and 5 team members.

There is 3 key Chief Ranger areas across the South East Melbourne District with Cardinia Sandbelt being one.

Cardinia Sandbelt have been allocated 2 months of the team from the 6 month engagement.

The first period commence for the whole team from the 10th of August for a month and again in November.

There will be many task's we'll be getting this team to help deliver that includes, planting, tree guard removal – recycling, road and trail maintenance, fence removal, fence construction, rabbit warren work, weed control etc.

There is a small budget allocation that will allow for the purchase of materials to assist with the delivery of the projects.

The Team will be based from Braeside and will be using the large shed in the Nursery as a daily meeting point. There has been 2 vehicles provided although this may be upgraded to 3 due to COVID-19 social distancing requirements. The staff are considered Parks Victoria Employee's and will be part of the local team whilst working in the local parkland area.

Once I have further details on the team I'll provide an update.


Please remember David at this very sad time.




Where We Are At


- > It Snowed Last Night
