#### Remembrance Day



Armistice Day (known as Remembrance Day) is on 11 November. The day World War One ended in 1918. It is remembered at 11am on the 11th day of the 11th month with one minute silence to remember the people who have died in wars. It is a time to acknowledge the courage and sacrifice of those who served their country and appreciate the peace they fought hard to achieve.

The Flanders Poppy has been used since 1921 in Australia. They commemorate Australian soldiers who died in war. The RSL sells them to raise funds and they are laid at war memorials on the

11 November and 25 April (Anzac Day). They were often seen on the Western Front during World War One. Our member, Kevin Thomas arranged through Rotary to present a very simple ceremony of wreath laying and the playing of the last post at the Dingley Village Cenotaph, Marcus Road.



#### Lest We Forget Ann Kilby (2/11/2020)

As we approach Remembrance Day 2020 we know that, as was ANZAC Day 2020, it will be commemorated in quite a different way to years past. However, despite the restrictions that we currently live with, it is important that we still take time out to reflect and give thanks.

November 11, 1918 was such an important day for the world for on that day at 11 am the Armistice was signed and what was known as the Great War, ended.

This war had such a profound effect on so many, my family included, and as a tribute to all who served and sacrificed for the good of their country I would like to briefly share the story of one of those soldiers; one who is very special to me.




Alexander Robert Learmonth (my paternal grandfather) at the age of 19, enlisted on the 15/8/1914 in the 1st Division of the 1st AIF. At number 919 he was among the very first to sign up. He served at Gallipoli and was then sent to the Western Front where he was involved in many battles in France and Belgium. As the war was winding down he left The Continent on October 13, 1918 and started making his way back to Australia arriving in December 1918 and was discharged the following February to return to his former employer to complete his apprenticeship. Alec married my grandmother Alice in 1921 and they had four sons, the second one being my father. This gentle man, dearly loved by all of us, never spoke of the horror of those 1532 days overseas preferring to live his life simply until his passing at age 79. I can't imagine his distress (although I have heard it was great) when his two eldest sons signed up for another war two decades later.


My family was fortunate in that my father and his brother also returned safely; other families were not so fortunate. As we approach 11/11/2020 we honour them all.

My grandfather had a small case in which was placed all of his war mementos. This case has been passed down to me and as I try to collate and record the collection for future generations I have come across a copy of the Continental Edition of the London Daily Mail dated October 13, 1918, the day Grandpa left The Continent. The articles make interesting reading and the younger members of the family are fascinated with the emotive language of the day. Of particular interest and relevance to today is the article about 'The Influenza' (see separate article). I have included a few snapshots from this very fragile newspaper and also the Order of Service for the Dedication of the Shrine of Remembrance, 11th November, 1934. I'm sure many other families would have similar treasures and they may like to share them with us another time.

As we approach November 11, 2020 we remember all those who have given so much in so many wars. *Lest We Forget*.









Today we were finally able to present Bryan Welbourne or Digger as we know him with a gift of appreciation that we have had for several years waiting for him to retire. McConnell Dowell & Decmill (Constructors of the Mordialloc Freeway) have recently given us, the Dingley Village Men's Shed, funds to manufacture and install two Bird Hides around the wetland in Braeside Park. A design using plastic rainwater tanks modified for the purpose was agreed to meet all the requirements necessary by Parks and all going well should proceed later this year or early next year, with completion before the bypass road is completed in April.

With a joint effort from the Bypass contractors, Parks, DVMS and Friends of the Park, all united in one project we should make something very practical and a valuable asset to the park and community. Drawings will be posted in the shed for your perusal and shed members can volunteer to join in and be a part of this project once we get started.


#### This only happens when it rains.

The heavy rainfall on the night of the 22 November (55mm in Braeside Park) have overflowed our box gutter in the Amenities shed and consequently we now have a major leakage that has damaged our false ceiling and has created a problem that is going to require quite some time and expense to repair it.



As we have had many members complain about the new extension workshop being a skillion roof structure and not a higher gable type which requires a box gutter and frequent cleaning you now know why as this structure was constructed as it did not suffer any leaks, the stormwater helped to fill our rainwater tank and any ground water flowed away from the shed via the swale drain.

Wingspan - 45 inches Weight. - about 3 lbs


Engine. - 3.2 cc( .19 cu.in )
