### What's been happening

### **A Team Report**

#### **Tuesday 13th September 2022**

We managed to get the excess concrete broken up and placed into two piles that the Park rangers will remove. Three holes were drilled in the top front wall to relieve the air pressure that can build up inside the hut when the wind is in the wrong direction. The windows were cleaned and the surrounding over grown grass was cut down to help the landscaping and to look a bit tidier. Looking good.

We now only have to continue the cutting of the grass, laying down some road base on the back of the hut to remove any trip hazard and make it easier for wheel chair access.







We also have some modifications to do on the first hide as soon as it is dry enough to get access around the road. We may install another seat outside the hut located under the tree.

#### Thursday 15th September 2022

Another miserable day however we managed to empty the trailer of donated timber and tidy up some racking to store the timber.

#### Monday 19th September 2022

Continued clearing out the rack, moving spare carpet tiles to the mezzanine roof above the toilet in the Amenities shed and stacking the timber in the top shelf.

We also measured up the extension of the dust extractor ducting to continue into the workshop extension and the to connect to the safety saw etc.

Working in the Park is ceased until the ground dries out sufficiently.

#### **Tuesday 20th September 2022**

No power onto the shed today so we did some garden cleanup outside the shed, filled in the holes in the swale drain, re-directed the spoon drain into the swale drain, in the carpark.

#### Thursday 22nd September 2022

We had the park trailer delivered to the Bird hide site with two wheel barrows to spread some road base at the rear of the hide to level up the ground to the hide base. The broken concrete was placed in front of the sunken tree to make easy access to the tree. Some more grass was cut down around the front and rear of the hide for a cleaner access.







#### Monday 26th September 2022

We started hanging the additional dust extractor duct to the Safety saw.

#### **Tuesday 27th September 2022**

Today we installed an old seat we had at the shed down in front of the Bird Hide under a tree. We then continued to install the dust extractor duct.

#### Thursday 29th September 2022

Started installing the dust extraction ducting on the Safety saw.

#### Monday 3rd October 2022

Continued the dust ducting and connected it to the existing dust extractor.

#### **Tuesday 4th October 2022**

Fitted the last pipe support bracket to the dust extractor pipe work and tested the unit. This is now working well and we now don't have to drag the extension hose over to the saw to operate it.









We removed the silt trap cover in the putting green and bailed out the water and silt build up in the trap. We then high pressure washed the inlet and outlet pipe line to the silt trap and insured that we had clean and full flowing pipe work.

#### THE SAILORS WHO HAULED THE QUEEN'S GUN CARRIAGE



When you saw the Royal Navy sailors pulling HM's coffin on the gun carriage on Monday, this is why.

Most news reports correctly state that the tradition dates back to Queen Victoria's funeral on 2 February 1901. However, they fail to mention the Great Western Railway's role in supplying the ropes for the sailors to

rig to the gun carriage on the occasion.

On 2 February 1901 the weather was extremely cold and the hawsers for the gun carriage to be used for the procession from Windsor railway station to the Castle had frozen. The horses intended to pull the gun carriage were also affected by the intense cold and had become restive and possibly dangerous during the wait for the delayed funeral train to arrive. It was at this point that the GWR played its essential part in what has become a tradition for subsequent state funerals.

The Duke of Portland, who was Master of the Horse at Queen Victoria's funeral, recalled what happened in a letter published in The Times on 28 January 1936 at the time of King George V's funeral: "Owing to the lateness of the train which conveyed Her Majesty's coffin from Paddington to Windsor the horses attached to the gun-carriage had become cold. When the word of command 'Walk ... March' was given, the leaders twice reared up, and then fell back on the other horses, which caused all six to fall down. "My recollection is that Admiral Sir Michael Culme-Seymour was in command of the large Naval Guard of Honour drawn up on the spot. As soon as Sir Michael saw what had occurred, he called out to me in his usual resonant voice, 'All right, my boys will soon straighten out this mess.'

He at once ordered them to go into the station and the station master procured ropes (from the communication cords of carriages). Sir Michael then ordered them to fall in and draw the gun-carriage from the station to the entrance to the Castle grounds at the end of the Long Walk and up the slope. It was a most touching and effective procession and, in my opinion, much more impressive than would have been the official procedure."

Thus, with inspired improvisation and the help of the GWR, began the tradition which the Royal Navy has claimed ever since of hauling the coffin at funerals of the monarch.

The ropes on the carriages were the external communication cords to alert the guard in an emergency. Our brake 3rd carriage No 416, built in 1891, still carries this system, so remember to take a look at it next time you visit Didcot Railway Centre."
