What's been happening



And Now for a Word from our Sponsor..... by Geoff Hergt

For months now our members have been expressing their concern about the pot holes in Cypress Drive leading up from the bitumen road, circumnavigating the Federation and Telford parks, to our shed complex in Braeside Park. This is also an issue for those volunteers attending the Migrant Garden complex near to our sheds as well as public wishing to attend the Visitors Centre and other parks in that locale.

On Friday Nov 18th Adrian Howard, the recently appointed Head Ranger at Braeside and Karkarook Parks, visited our weekly shed meeting to advise and update members on the situation.

With a full house of our members Adrian was very informative, candid and helpful in his advice about the works which are shortly to commence.

The current situation is as follows:-


- a) Cypress Drive between the bitumen road at the northern end of Braeside Park and our shed has been temporarily closed pending road works.
- b) Commencement of road works is dependent upon the availability of the appropriate machinery and the weather.
- c) It is intended to rip up the existing road, resurface and compound it so that although it will still be a compacted dirt road the pot hole and drainage situation will be much improved. Consideration toward making it a bitumen road will be discussed however the cost may be an issue.
- d) It is hoped that the work will be commenced asap and completed before the crowds arrive over the coming holiday season.

Adrian then took questions from the floor of which there were many. Having spent at least half an hour with us Adrain left to commence his usual duties.

We are grateful to have the opportunity to hear "straight from the horse's mouth" what is intended, about to occur and the future of matters within the park which affect our shed members, other voluntary users and the public.

Access to Rosella car park is from the bitumen road at the northern end of Braeside park, which runs parallel to Lower Dandenong Road, via the gate located there.

This gate is usually locked so it is imperative that any member entering or exiting Cypress Drive via that gate ensure that the gate is closed once they have completed their movement in or out.



This gate need not be locked except if you are the LAST person in or out. If a fellow shed member is following you, ensure that whilst you open the gate they close it after themselves. No different to lifting the bollard in or out as we used to do except that closing a swinging gate is much easier.

The idea is to prevent the public from entering that part of the park and not know where to go afterwards. *This has already happened hence the closing of the gate being critical.*

A Team Report

Monday 17th October 2022

With so many complaints that the Cypress Drive Bollard was too heavy so we started to manufacture one that is considerably lighter.

Tuesday 18th October 2022

Painted the bollard.

Started manufacture of a caster board to mount the larger vacuum cleaner to be able to move this about in the shed.

Repaired the blind on the south side of the shed. The holding brackets were bent and these were replaced and the blind was raised and re-adjusted to operate correctly.



Thursday 20th October 2022

Another coat of paint on the bollard and fixed on the "NO ENTRY" signs and reflector tape.

The four rubbish bins were taken to the skip by Vaughn & John.

Four stiffening brackets was made to fit the lifesavers reels support, with bolt holes drilled and bolts fitted.

(Photos of the bollard will be included soon but it may still be a while until we have access to Cypress Drive.)

Friday 28th October 2022

Measured the drum and made a sample hub to fit drum.

Monday 31st October 2022

The stiffening brackets had to be countersunk deeper and re-fitted to the reel supports.

The drum hubs were cut out and fitted to the pipe drum and a couple of extra screws fitted. The drive plate was cut out and fitted to the drum ends.





28th November 2022

The new rubber extrusions were fitted and joined onto the reels. We then welded the drive plate to the shaft and fitted all drum items to the reel and installed into its location. Then secured the bearing bracket with new pop rivets. The reel guides stops had to be relocated and adjusted.





29th November 2022

Machined new shaft spacers and drilled lubrication holes in the bearing housings. We had to make a new drive pin for the handle and assembled the complete unit.

We then coiled the rope onto the drum reel and spliced the rope to the life belt.



The only parts for completion is a Brake and cap nut which are to be supplied.



Remembering For All Ages

At the Dingley cenotaph in Marcus Road this Nov 11th ceremony was clearly for all ages.

IL SILENZIO ... Beautiful and Haunting.

About six miles from Maastricht, in the Netherlands, lie buried 8,301 American soldiers who died in "Operation Market Garden" in the battles to liberate Holland in the fall/winter of 1944. Every one of the men buried in the cemetery, as well as those in the Canadian and British military cemeteries, has been adopted by a Dutch family who mind the grave, decorate it, and keep alive the memory of the soldier they have adopted. It is even the custom to keep a portrait of "their" soldier in a place of honour in their home.

Annually, on "Liberation Day," memorial services are held for "the men who died to liberate Holland." The day concludes with a concert. The final piece is always "Il Silenzio," a memorial piece commissioned by the Dutch and first played in 1965 on the 20th anniversary of Holland's liberation. It has been the concluding piece of the memorial concert ever since.

This year, the soloist was a 13-year-old Dutch girl, Melissa Venema, backed by André Rieu and his orchestra (the Royal Orchestra of the Netherlands). This beautiful concert piece is based upon the original version of taps and was composed by Italian composer, Nino Rossi.
